

## **Pastoral Care**

In early 2017, the Vestry reviewed and adopted, "[Pastoral Care Principles and Practice: Episcopal Church of the Holy Communion](#)," prepared by our priest associate, The Rev. Marc Smith with the rector. This document discusses the theological basis for pastoral care, its historical evolution and the many ways it might be engaged by the Holy Communion laity and clergy. Subsequently, these principles have been used to structure and guide the care of the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of our members, as well as the larger community.

### **Lay Eucharistic Ministers**

Seven Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEM) were trained and commissioned during the past year to assist with the congregation's sacramental ministry. Paired LEMs are sent bi-monthly from the 10:30 Sunday worship service to deliver Communion to those who are homebound or in nursing homes or hospitals. Importantly, these visits complement (but do not substitute for) the regular visits of the clergy. Quarterly meetings of the LEMs also have been instituted to provide a forum for ongoing education, mutual care and spiritual growth. ### **Flower Ministry**

Each Sunday that flowers adorn the altar, two vases are prepared from them and delivered to two people on the pastoral care list – those who are homebound, recently bereaved or experiencing significant stress. Flowers also are used to mark notable birthdays and life events. At Christmas and Easter, flowers are sent to all who are homebound or grieving the death of a loved one. You're invited to help deliver flowers and a card from the clergy by picking up both on the table in the lounge each Sunday. The individual's name and address are on the card.

### **Meal Ministry**

### **Clergy Pastoral Care**

Central to the ministry of Holy Communion is the clergy's oversight of and personal involvement in pastoral care, including member visits and Communion, short-term counseling and community engagement.
